Author of Lilith at Schiowitz Lecture May 29

Susan Weidman Schneider, the founder of the award-winning Jewish women's magazine *Lilith*, will present this spring's Lillian Schiowitz Memorial Lecture on Thursday, May 29, at 8:15 P.M. in the Sanctuary. The lecture is entitled "Jewish and Female: Where Do We Go From Here?"

The Schiowitz Lecture series has become an important new tradition at Temple Israel. The lecture series focuses on issues important to Lillian Schiowitz and is endowed by long-time Temple member Dr. Stanley Schiowitz in memory of his wife Lillian and is presented by the Temple Israel Institute for Lifelong Learning.

Lilith magazine, along with Ms. Schneider's books, articles and lectures, are frequently credited with changing the way women see themselves and their roles in the Jewish community.

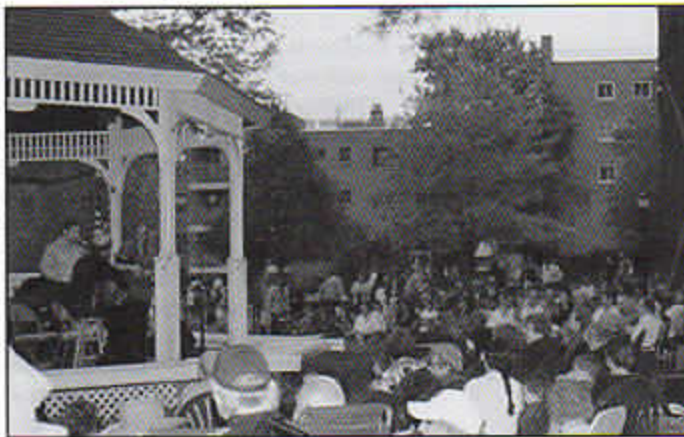

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Restoring Torahs

EDITOR'S NOTE: Temple Torahs are being carefully restored by the congregation's Torah Restoration Committee, chaired by Dr. Charles I. Adler. He tells of the committee's progress in this Voice Guest Column.

"And now you shall write this song..."

The Torah is God's gift to the Jewish people. It is a *mitzvah* for each and every Jew to write this "song" (the Torah) for him or herself. Throughout history, *sofrim*, Torah scribes, have completed this sacred task of writing *Sifrei Torah* for our people.

Jewish law is very specific about what makes a Torah kosher. Every step in the creation of a new scroll, or repairing an old one, has to be made with one purpose in mind—a single thought—*Leshem Mitzvat Torah* (for the specific purpose of fulfilling the *mitzvah*

of writing a Torah scroll). Only with this thought will the Torah take on its role as a vehicle for God's wisdom in this world. By writing, or repairing, a Torah, we proclaim the everlasting and eternal connection we share with our creator and our people.

Although we are always very careful about treating a *Sefer Torah* with respect, over time even the best scrolls can become *pasul*, or unfit for ritual use. A *sofer* can carefully examine the scroll to determine the extent of the repair needed or if it is not usable for ritual purposes. A *pasul* Torah may still be used for educational purposes.

Over the past two years the Torah Restoration Committee of Temple Israel, which I have led, has taken on the task of having our Torahs examined and of having ten Torahs restored. The last Torah is almost completely restored, with the exception of letters that have been outlined, but still need to be filled in. The filling in of a letter in a *Sefer Torah* fulfills the 613th Commandment, or *mitzvah*, and it is one *mitzvah* each person

Zachary Stecker will be called to the Torah as a *Bar Mitzvah* on May 31. He is the son of Deanna and Rabbi Howard Stecker and has two brothers, Joshua, 17, and Daniel, 15. Zach is a seventh grade student at the Solomon Schechter Day School of Nassau County. He enjoys spending his summers at Camp Ramah in the Berkshires, and likes art, acting and playing the piano. Zach has been to Israel once, and can't wait to go back with his family in the near future. The congregation is invited to celebrate with the Stecker family on this wonderful occasion.

Once we put away our groggers and masks children of Beth HaGan turned to thoughts of spring and *Pesach*. Teachers helped children create uniquely beautiful *Haggadot*, *seider* plates, Elijah cups and matzah covers. Teachers spent much creative energy reenacting the story of Passover, with Moses, Pharaoh, and all the ten plagues. We crossed the Red Sea and as we walked on dry land, we sang *Dayanu* and *Elyahu Honani*. Although we were unable to host parents this year, each class had a wonderful model *seider* and learned how to conduct a real *seider*. Reports from families who participated in communal *seiderim*, or private *sedouri* with family and friends, told us that the children truly did us proud. Many even led the *seider*, relating stories and *midrashim* that they learned. The Matzah Factory visited again this year, entertaining and teaching the children the process of matzah baking from the moment the wheat is cut until it arrives in neat little packages. Each child baked his own matzah and received an official hand made Shmurah matzah for the *seider*.

Since our return to school, children have focused on Yom Ha'azmaut and our "Israel Experience." We have applied for and re-

ceived passports and are just adding the finishing touches to our ElAl jet, lovingly crafted by Bassal, which is in the hangar and ready to carry the Beth HaGan kids to Israel. There we will experience the excitement of Tel Aviv, squeeze oranges on a kibbutz, dip in the warm waters of Eilat, and pray at the Western Wall. We'll snack on blue and white cookies in a Bedouin tent and sing and dance the hora. Kudos are in order to Joanna Es-haghoff, Orly Victory, Laura Gal, Ellen Nahavandi, Beth Spero and all the wonderful PTA moms who always give of themselves for the Beth HaGan kids.

The next day, all Beth HaGan students hosted their mothers at a special Mother's Day Tea. Mommies were honored, and feted and wined and dined to a medley of songs and performances. All the children created beautiful Mother's Day gifts, which were presented at the Tea. A special *Oneg Shabbat* was celebrated, as well.

Beth HaGan will celebrate Lag B'Omer on Friday, May 23, with a picnic and activities commemorating the days of the Roman occupation of Israel. The story of Rabbi Shimion Bar Yachov in the classes will be presented for Lag B'Omer.

Our annual Literary Art Fair will take place on Wednesday, June 4, at 5:30 P.M., in the Crystal Ballroom. The event always brings in record crowds because it showcases not only the creative, artistic aspect of the children's development, but also illustrates the growing love of literature that the children are acquiring. When we read a book, we study the illustrator, too, to understand how the pictures enhance the script and make it meaningful. So, save the date and bring the entire family. The teachers and children are hard at work preparing for this event.

Ms. Schneider's major articles have covered, among other subjects, Jewish women's philanthropy, the Jewish stake in abortion rights, gender stereotypes of Jews and the positive effects of feminism on Jewish life. She has won several journalism awards and has discussed the issues she has covered on national media, including "Oprah!", "Good Morning America" and CNN. Her work has been featured in The New York Times, Newsweek, Glamour and USA Today.

She is the author of three books, "Jewish and Female," the first book to take a comprehensive look at Jewish women's special concerns; "Intermarriage: The Challenge of Living with Differences between Christians and Jews;" and "Head and Heart," about money in the lives of women.

Dr. Schiowitz established the lecture series at Temple Israel to memorialize his wife of 59 years, "a wonderful woman," who passed away four years ago. "I wanted to establish something for the congregation about which my wife would have said: 'Let's go and listen to that,'" he said. "I established the series to improve our synagogue and I urge others to think about doing the same."

Dr. Schiowitz and his wife moved to Great Neck from their native Brooklyn "temporarily" in 1979. They met in the Catskills, where Dr. Schiowitz played the trumpet as a teen. He recalled first meeting his wife, who was with her father at one of the area's small hotels. They married when they were both 22 and "I'm still in love with her," he said.

In Great Neck, Mrs. Schiowitz, who enjoyed folk dancing, was active in the Temple Sisterhood in the 1980s. She also eagerly participated in Grace Avenue Senior Center activities.

Dr. Schiowitz, a Brooklyn osteopathic physician, closed his practice to teach at the Long Island-based New York College of Osteopathic Medicine. After 25 years at the school, he retired on his 80th birthday as dean and provost for medical affairs.

The lectures in memory of Mrs. Schiowitz, have only one condition, Dr. Schiowitz said. "They should feature a female speaker about any topic that affects Jewish life anywhere in the world."

Gary Sazer, chair of the Temple Israel Institute for Life Long Learning, said, "Temple Israel and the entire Great Neck community are very grateful to Dr. Schiowitz for endowing this important lecture series. We are very proud to host this lecture series here at Temple Israel and look forward to another wonderful presentation."

Magda Fishman, who has served in the Israeli Army Orchestra as a vocal soloist and trumpet player, and Aaron Bensoussan, former cantor at Temple Beth Sholom in Roslyn.

"Just three months ago Temple Israel suffered a tremendous loss when a fire engulfed nearly half of our building," said congregation President Richard Kestenbaum to the large crowd assembled in the park. "Fortunately, there were no injuries or loss of life. We know this was due in large part to the bravery and quick action of our local fire and

police departments.

"We often take their work for granted. However, the dedicated men and women who comprise our local police and fire departments think little of putting themselves in harm's way to save others. Jewish tradition teaches us about 'fixing the world.' These brave men and women...help to repair a broken world."

He thanked each of the departments that fought the blaze and presented each with a plaque of appreciation. His comments were met with cheers and a standing ovation by the overflow audience.

should most definitely try to fulfill.

The Temple is planning a *Siyum HaTorah*, or celebration for the completion of the writing of a *Sefer Torah*, in the fall. *Sefer Zerach* Greenfield, who has completed our Torah restorations, will describe the process of repairing Torahs and tell us the history of them. We encourage adults and children to plan to be participants in the *Siyum*. Each individual will have an opportunity to work with the *Sefer* to fill in an outlined letter. After all the letters are completed, we will have a celebration.

Temple Israel, in the past, has completed the restoration of two Torahs with the participation of generous members of the congregation. Most recently, in February 2007, Dr. and Mrs. Joseph Spector and their extended family helped *Sefer* Greenfield by filling in the remaining letters of one of our restored Torahs. A very generous gift by the Spectors provided funds for much of the restoration of our Torahs so far.

For our *Siyum HaTorah*, individuals will have the opportunity to fulfill the *mitzvah* of "writing" his or her own Torah by making a contribution to the Torah Restoration Fund and actually filling in an outlined letter in the Torah.

We would like to extend an invitation to members of the congregation to participate in the planning of the *Siyum HaTorah* by joining a committee about to be formed. share an evening of learning, building, eating, singing and schmoozing from which all of us can emerge more deeply aware of the issues that confront us as modern Jews.

Please look out for the specific publicity for Shavuot that will be issued in the coming days, elaborating on all of the programs and sessions being offered. May 8 brought us a night of musical transformation. Let June 8 witness a night of spiritual revelation. Don't stay home that night. Come to Temple Israel. Sinai is waiting.

Bar/Bat Mitzvah INVITATIONS

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D'VAR TORAH

Behar

Saturday, May 17

The Holiness Code continues with a group of laws that are to take effect when the Israelites enter the Promised Land, in this portion. The people will be permitted to work the land for six years, but the seventh year is to be a Sabbatical year of complete rest for the land. In order to provide sufficient food, God promises that the crop of the sixth year will yield enough for three years. Further, after seven cycles of seven years, the 50th year is to be a Jubilee—a year of release for the land and all of its inhabitants. There follow a series of laws concerning redemption of land and persons. The basic principle of land redemption is that all land belongs to God, and human owners possess it only as land holders. It is not the owners' right to dispose of as they wish, and it cannot be permanently alienated. As for persons, if one had to indenture himself to work off debt, he was not to be abused and was to be redeemed as quickly as possible. The portion ends with a prohibition against idolatry and an admonition to keep God's sabbaths.

Behukotai

Saturday, May 24

This portion concludes the Book of Leviticus. The Holiness Code ends with a promise and a curse. If the Israelites follow God's laws and commandments, they will be blessed with peace, prosperity and security. If they do not obey, however, a long list of the most dire consequences will ensue. The final chapter of Leviticus deals with providing funding for the *Mishkan*. Offerings may be made in silver equivalent to the value of a person, and a scale of equivalents is provided. Offerings may also be made in the form of animals and property. Finally provision is made for tithes. Thus, the entire description of the sanctuary, its functioning and the type of life it is supposed to engender in the Israelites concludes with the establishment of a pattern of generosity toward our places of worship which continues down to our own time and becomes a basic element of community life wherever Jews settle.
