## Temple Celebrating Yom Ha'atzmaut With Concert May 10

To celebrate Yom Ha'atzmaut, Israel Independence Day, Temple Israel will host a concert on Tuesday, May 10 featuring a unique blend of Israeli, Middle Eastern and Persian music. Headlining the program will be Cantor Raphael Frieder and Galeet Dardashti, along with her band, Divahn.

Cantor Frieder has served as Temple Israel's cantor since 1991. In addition to being a renowned cantor, he is also a performer of opera, as well as classical, Jewish and Israeli music. He is one of Israel's leading baritones. Cantor Frieder has toured extensively in Israel, Europe and the United States, appearing in venues from Lincoln Center and Carnegie Hall to the Notre Dame Cathedral in Paris and Tel Aviv's Mann Auditorium. He has worked with some of the world's leading conductors, including Zubin Mehta and Roger Norrington. He was chosen by Leonard Bernstein to perform the world premiere of one of Bernstein's last works, "Arias and Barcaroles." Cantor Frieder has also made numerous recordings for Israel National Radio, appeared on many television programs, and played the role of the cantor in the hit film "Keeping The Faith."

Galeet Dardashti, vocalist and musician (guitar and percussion), is the granddaughter of Yona Dardashti, the most renowned singer of Persian classical music in Iran in his day, and daughter of highly esteemed cantor Farid Dardashti. Middle Eastern vocal innovator Galeet Dardashti is the first woman to continue her family tradition of distinguished Persian and Jewish musicianship. She leads Divahn, an edgy all-female ensemble, which will perform with her. The group specializes in sophisticated harmonies and entrancing improvisations and funky arrangements incorporate Indian, Middle Eastern and Latin percussion. The group has performed worldwide.

The concert begins at 8:15 P.M. and is free and open to the public.

## Let Freedom Rise Up

With Passover food for thought and stomach still being digested, I wanted to offer a distilled version of my Passover sermon about freedom. The philosopher, Jean Jacques Rousseau, began "The Social Contract" with the observation that while people are born free, they somehow inevitably end up in chains. I would argue that in three realms, we are not as free as we might imagine. And yet, there is a way out.

If we are preoccupied with others' opinions of us to the point where our own inclinations, style and values are eclipsed, then we are not especially free. Do we dress the way we feel is stylish and tasteful or are we unduly affected by the perceptions of others? Are our celebrations a reflection of our own style and values, or primarily an attempt to impress others? What thought processes govern the way we give *tzedakah*? Our ancestors in Egypt maintained elements of their distinct identity and, generations later, our ancestors in Palestine navigated the seductive aspects of Greco-Roman culture

without forfeiting their core Jewishness. It's not always easy to find an appropriate balance between self-assertiveness and sensitivity to the influence of others. When we find that balance, however, we know it. And real freedom has begun.

If we allow our opinions of others to be shaped primarily by generalizations, then we are less free than we might be. Generalizations, stereotypes if you will, are shortcuts that save us the trouble, but simultaneously deny us the pleasure, of getting to know each other as individuals. Our ancestors in Egypt discovered that not all Egyptians were a certain way and a subsequent generation observed that unlike coins, no two human beings are alike. When we move beyond stereo-

When I was a kid, I missed the many products I couldn't eat during the Passover holiday, but now, with kosher for Passover bagels, cereals, and nearly every other product made in a way that is kosher for Passover, I (and my stomach) am just plain tired of matzah. When they said, "Let my people go," they really meant it!

However, there are many positives to the holiday. To me it is an opportunity to *kvel*, hearing my kids sing the same songs at our seder that I sang when I was young. I also

In fact, although we recognize that parenthood and family responsibility is paramount in instilling a strong Jewish identity in our youth, we also recognize that the responsibility is not solely theirs. It has been a long-standing practice at Temple Israel to join with our member families in helping to foster Jewish pride in our youth.

While we always hope to send our children off to college knowing who they are, our success has not been universal. We have now concluded that there is still room to improve, with particular immediate emphasis on our high school, where success for the last number of years has been questioned.

Of course, finding the right personnel to champion this is challenging, especially in times of heightened budget concerns. However, we are not deterred by the challenges and will continue to try to find the "sweet spot" where we can engage the best practices in the business or create our own, if that's what it takes, to fulfill our responsibilities to our synagogue, our youth and the greater community.

## TEMPLE STAFF SPOTLIGHT Kathy Recckia

**EDITOR'S NOTE:** Temple Israel's dedicated staff helps shape the character of the congregation. This new regular Voice feature profiles many of the staff members.

Kathy Recckia came to Temple Israel ten years ago as a temp to type tributes for the massive special journal marking Rabbi Mordecai Waxman's 55th year as the spiritual leader of the congregation.

She decided she liked what she saw at Temple Israel. But before she could ask for a full time position, then Executive Director Harriet Schiff offered her a job. "It was love at first temp," she recalled with a chuckle.

Since that time, she has held a series of increasingly responsible positions and currently serves as administrative assistant to Rabbi Howard Stecker and Cantor Raphael Frieder. In addition, she is the secretary for the Waxman High School and Youth House and has served in that position for four successive school directors.

Among her many responsibilities at Temple Israel, she handles ticket sales for the Temple Israel Players, keeps records to coordinate High Holy Day services, helps to coordinate the scheduling of *B'nai Mitzvot* and Temple member *aufrufs* and baby namings, coordinates *shiva min-*

*yan* leaders, handles the sale of *lulavim* and *etrogim* for Sukkot, and the sale of *chametz* for Passover.

"I like my job a lot," she said on a recent late Friday afternoon as Rabbi Stecker and Rabbi Seth Adelson hovered over her desk to check on different items. "And, I love the spiritual atmosphere. It is about making the world a better place."

She said she also enjoys working at the Youth House, where she initiated a regular e-mail to parents with school news. "The kids there are great and it is fantastic to watch them grow. When they first come in, they don't realize the value of what is being offered to them in the building. But then they mature and leave as different people."

Ten years ago she married her husband, Rob, in a wedding ceremony at Disneyworld. The ceremony was at the Disney chapel and the reception was at a restaurant above the Living Seas exhibit. Her husband will be graduating this year from St. Johns Law School. Kathy maintains a 3.7 average in her studies at York College, where she will earn her bachelors degree in psychology next year.

Since she practices another religion and



didn't know anything about Hebrew or Judaism before coming to Temple Israel, she said she enjoys being able to frequently talk to the clergy about theology. She said she particularly enjoys the spontaneous discussions about Judaism she has with Rabbis Adelson and Stecker. "And," she said, "I love the language and am doing whatever I can to learn Hebrew."

Interestingly, she said she is very strict about observing Jewish laws and practices while at Temple Israel. "In my view," she said, "while I am here, I am a guest in God's house. It is as if I am in his living room, so I have to be respectful of his laws. I am very happy to have this job. The least I can do is be respectful of the God who gave it to me.

"And," she added, "my favorite thing about this job is that I get paid to be spiritual all day."

reotypes and take the time to get to know people one on one, the chains start to loosen up and real freedom begins.

To the extent that we underestimate our own capacity to make a difference in the world, we are not as free as we need to be. In a recent article, Leonard Fein told a moving story about a student of the Baal Shem Tov, the founder of Hasidism, who complained that Elijah never comes when we open the door for him at the seder. The Baal Shem Tov urged his student to bring Passover food for a needy family nearby and to spend the seder with them, which he did. When the family opened the door for Elijah, no one was there, which the student conveyed to his teacher after the holiday was over. The following year, the Baal Shem Tov told his student that he should go back to the same house with food and, this time, wait before knocking on the door. The student overheard the husband complaining to his wife that they had no food for Passover. The wife told him not to worry. Just as Elijah had come the year before with enough food for the seder, he would surely come again. To the extent that we recognize our ability to make even a small difference, a profound liberation starts to take shape. We bear the spark of Elijah.

Rousseau's statement traces a negative arc, from freedom to slavery. We begin free and subsequently become encumbered by a host of constraints. The Passover story, as encapsulated in the Haggadah, traces a series of positive arcs from darkness to light, from slavery to freedom, culminating with the words, "We will sing a new song before God."

We can sing a new song, a song of freedom. It's up to us.

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## D'VAR TORAH

### Kedoshim

Saturday, April 30

The Holiness Code continues with laws concerning interpersonal relationships and modes of behavior. Some of these laws echo the Ten Commandments and deal with such matters as reverence for parents, the Sabbath, idolatry, stealing and deceitful conduct, false oaths and the identification of God as the redeemer from the slavery of Egypt. Other laws of secular and religious nature touch upon agriculture, testimony, social ethics and certain rituals connected with sacrifice. In the second part of the portion, the Torah reiterates its concern with the family in a religious context and reformulates rules previously stated concerning incest and forbidden sexual activity. Here, however, the rules are presented from a slightly different perspective. The portion concludes with an admonition that possession of the land of Israel will be dependent upon faithfully observing these laws of holiness in this portion.

### Emor

Saturday, May 7

In this portion, the Holiness Code continues with laws concerning the maintaining of ritual purity by the priests. In particular, we find laws regulating the marriages of priests, limiting their participation in funerals and specifying the blemishes, which may disqualify a priest from officiating. This section ends with an admonition not to profane God's holy name, but to hallow it among the Israelites. The Code then turns to the sacred seasons and presents a calendar of the festivals on which cessation from work is mandated. The list begins with *Shabbat* and continues chronologically from *Pesach*. Cessation from work is a crucial element in the account of creation and, by observing the festivals, the Israelites are led to emulate one of God's major characteristics and achieve holiness.

## SABBATH SERVICES

Friday, April 29
